The Lord has Chosen Zion - Psalm 132 Notes, Family Worship, Bible Reading

Notes from the Sermon

The Psalms of Ascent take us on a journey with the Israelites on the road to a festival in Jerusalem. A festival that was to be a celebration of the presence of God. Along the way they worship their God. Through song they recall the hard times, the blessed times and recognize that God is with them through it all.

Psalm 132 has two main sections. Verses 1-10 are a prayer to God from Israelites where they recall the story of the ark, the importance of it in their worship life, the difficulties of returning it to it's rightful place in Jerusalem. In their prayer the express amazement at how God has worked in their lives. Verses 11-18 are expressions from God on how He has kept his covenant with the Israelites. In these verses we see answers to specific prayers from the first section. In the answers we see that our God provided even more than what was asked for.

Our God promises that all of the pain and suffering we encounter in this fallen world is going to be used for His ultimate glory. He promises that one day all things will be restored and we will fully see His glory face to face. He will wipe away every tear and we will live in His presence in His Kingdom. We are on our own ascent, on our way to this place that we only have glimpses of in the here and now. Like the Israelites, we will one day experience our version of verses 11-18 and stand in amazement in the greatness of our King, Lord Jesus.
