Jesus Has a Better Word - Hebrews 4:12-13 Notes, Family Worship, Bible Reading

Notes from the Sermon

In the flow of his argument, the author of Hebrews pauses to remind his readers and hearers about the foundational basis for everything he has written. He is not just posturing and pondering, rather, Hebrews heavily leans in to the text of the Old Testament, the Scriptures for the Jewish people. They believed (as we do) that the Scriptures are vastly more than a series of human books about God, rather, they are the very Word of God. This does not deny human authorship, but is the claim that God Himself inspired the very words the human authors (including the author of our book, Hebrews) in such a way that he used their imperfect humanity to articulate His perfect Word. No wonder our author makes the claim that the Word of God is living, powerful, and penetrating to the deepest parts of our humanity. Our sermon this week looked at the claim in Hebrews 4 about the Word and reminded us about the core doctrines we believe about Scripture.

Fast facts about the Bible

- The Bible has 66 books
- In 2 sections Old Testament and New Testament
- 39 Old Testament Books

The Bible is a completely divine book, meaning that every word contained in the text comes from the heart and mouth of God. But it is also a completely human book, meaning that all of the Scriptures were written by men under the inspiration of God, yet using their life situation, personality, problems, and even sinfulness as they wrote. This is a miracle. In fact, we can cite **three miracles** God has performed to get us the Scriptures as we have them today.

- 1. INSPIRATION The miracle of God speaking through flawed people to give us His perfect Word.
- 2. PRESERVATION God protected the integrity of the Bible, even though people throughout history have tried to destroy it and have persecuted those who kept it.
- 3. ILLUMINATION Every time I read the Bible and understand it, God is present and performing a miracle.

Four characteristics of the Bible

- SUFFICIENCY The Scriptures as we have them are God's full revelation of Himself and is all that we need to know God and understand the Gospel.
- CLARITY The Bible is written in such a way that all things necessary for our salvation and for our Christian life and growth are very clearly set forth in Scripture.

- FINAL/AUTHORITY All the words in Scripture are God's words in such a way that to disbelieve or disobey any word of Scripture is to disbelieve or disobey God.
- NECESSITY the Bible in necessary for knowing the gospel, for maintaining spiritual life, and for knowing God's will, but not necessary for knowing that God exists or for knowing something about God's character and moral laws.

The message of the Bible

Every word in the Bible is pointing to Jesus. Laws show us our need, songs and poems are about Him, and prophecies told that Jesus was on the way.
